The Pandemic's Impact May Change our Behavior Forever The economic impact of the pandemic has had a profound impact on the livelihood and health of individuals and small businesses. According to several studies, 60% of Gen Z and millennials are extremely concerned about threats to their health and 40% of baby boomers share a similar perspective; 88% of organizations have encouraged or required their employees to work from home; 61% plan to continue watching more news after the pandemic has ended; 55% will prioritize more time with family; 45% of adults report their mental health has been negatively impacted due to worry and stress over the virus; and 90% of individuals say money has had an impact on their stress levels. Employers are able to guide the transition into this new normal by offering benefits that help address new issues like financial burdens. **TrueConnect** is a voluntary financial wellness benefit that offers affordable, low-risk loans at no cost to the employer, and automated through payroll deductions. Navajo Nation and Its Battle with COVID-19

Spanning portions of Arizona, New Mexico, and Utah, the 27,000 square mile Navajo Nation is home to 180,000 people served by just 13 grocery stores and four hospitals. An estimated 40% of reservation households are without running water and/or electricity. Before COVID-19 arrived, Native Americans were already at a distinct disadvantage. According the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, broken treaties with the federal government have left many reservations without adequate access to clean water, plumbing, electricity, internet, cell service, roads, public transportation, housing, hospitals, and schools.

The first case of COVID-19 was reported on March 17 and within days the number was well over 100. Officials on the reservation say a lack of infrastructure makes communicating with constituents difficult. Because they don't have electricity, most families rely on nonperishable goods. EPA announces new funding for water infrastructure projects

The new funding could provide up to \$6 billion in loans and leverage over \$12 billion for water infrastructure projects. Those seeking WIFIA credit assistance must submit a <u>letter of inter-</u><u>est</u> (LOI) and all required documents emailed to <u>wifia@epa.gov</u>.
