American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funds Bernalillo County

• Bernalillo County was identified as an eligible local government to receive \$131,911,293 in direct aid to combat the economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic (two tranches: \$65,955,646.50 in 2021, \$65,955,646.50 in 2022).






Economic Relief Partnership – UpTogether

In August of 2022, Bernalillo County, in partnership with UpTogether launched the Bernalillo County Economic Relief program. This program provided a total of \$1.8 million in one-time direct cash payments of \$1,000 to each eligible individual who did not qualify for previously issued Federal Stimulus funding. To date, UpTogether has disbursed 1,710 payments, totaling \$1.71 million. UpTogether prioritized those residents who live within Bernalillo County (unincorporated) outside of the City Albuquerque (incorporated).









Best Practices and Hurdles

Hurdles/Challenges

- Timelines on projects have been pushed out due to several factors including:
 - Continually changing guidance (Reporting Guidance and Final Rule)
 - Uniform Guidance requirements and the need to update internal procedures
 - Rising cost of construction on infrastructure and capital projects
 - Increasing cost of labor and shortage of workers
 - Increasing cost of materials
 - Supply chain issues (acquisition and additional resources)
 - Bernalillo County's Community Workforce Agreement (CWA) challenges

Best Practices

- Created and maintaining written procedures for the administration of ARPA
- Established governance teams to oversee ARPA projects
- Followed GFOA guiding principles on implementation (see Supplemental Information)
- Conducting risk-based due diligence
- Developed archive system to maintain records

Guiding Principle	County's Actions
Care should be taken to avoid creating new programs or add-ons to existing programs that require an ongoing financial commitment	The county has no plans to expand existing programs that require on-going financial commitment. However, could consider one-time initiatives within those programs after the appropriate analysis.
Replenishing reserves used to offset revenue declines during the pandemic should be given high priority to rebuild financial flexibility/stability and restore fiscal resiliency.	County reserves are at required levels and there are no current plans to increase existing reserves.
Use of ARPA funds to cover operating deficits caused by COVID-19 should be considered temporary and additional budget restraint may be necessary to achieve/maintain structural balance in future budgets.	We WILL NOT be using the ARPA funds to cover or address operating deficits.
Investment in critical infrastructure is particularly well-suited use of ARPA funds because it is a non-recurring expenditure that can be targeted to strategically important long- term assets that provide benefits over many years. However, care should be taken to assess any on-going operating costs that may be associated with the project.	We are starting by reviewing and prioritizing projects from the CIP that are lacking funding to complete and can be completed by December 31, 2024. The first projects from the CIP being considered and prioritized are the infrastructure projects related to: • Water • Sewer • Broadband Any associated on-going (recurring) operating costs will be assessed as these can't be funded with ARPA funds.



GFOA guiding principles on implementation

 ARPA Scanning and Partnering Efforts: State and local jurisdictions should be aware of plans for ARPA funding throughout their communities.

	Guiding Principle	County's Actions
	Local jurisdictions should be cognizant of state-level ARPA efforts, especially regarding infrastructure, potential enhancements of state funding resources, and existing or new state law requirements.	We are working with both federal and state lobbyists on issues. In addition, we will coordinate with New Mexico Counties (NMC), State of New Mexico, City of Albuquerque and other entities as necessary.
õ	Consider regional initiatives, including partnering with other ARPA recipients. It is possible there are many beneficiaries of ARPA funding within your community, such as schools, transportation agencies and local economic development authorities. Be sure to understand what they are planning and augment their efforts; alternatively, creating cooperative spending plans to enhance the structural financial condition of your community.	Similar response as above. The county may collaborate, coordinate and potentially partner with other governmental bodies or agencies as necessary to appropriately address and fund regional initiatives after thorough analysis. Examples of entities are: • New Mexico Counties (NMC), • State of New Mexico • City of Albuquerque • Other entities A process and/or approach would need to be defined. We are tapping into all resources to gain the best understanding of all information and proposed initiatives. Additionally, the county participates in calls, webinars or other calls for action that are addressing all aspects of the ARPA such as: • NACo membership calls • GFOA weekly membership calls • Federal lobbyists • State lobbyists • US Department of the Treasury



GFOA guiding principles on implementation

 Take Time and Careful **Consideration**: ARPA funds will be issued in two tranches to local governments. Throughout the years of outlays, and until the end of calendar year 2024, consider how the funds may be used to address rescue efforts and lead to recovery.

Guiding Principle	County's Actions
Use other dedicated grants and programs first whenever possible and save ARPA funds for priorities not eligible for other federal and state assistance programs.	In assessing current projects in the CIP, all funding sources are being considered along with the requirements.
Whenever possible, expenditures related to the ARPA funding should be spread over the qualifying period (through December 31, 2024) to enhance budgetary and financial stability.	To the extent that funding is assigned to capital projects, the project timelines will be followed and used to plan cash flow needs for spending and investments. Potential to create bonding capacity for other projects in the 2022 and 2024 GO Bond elections.
Adequate time should be taken to carefully consider all alternatives for the prudent use of ARPA funding prior to committing the resources to ensure the best use of the temporary funding.	The county has begun prioritizing initiatives, consulting with management and commissioners to ensure alignment with county priorities to maximize the use of the ARPA funds.
