Call to Order/Pledge of Allegiance / Roll Call / Introductions

Chair Lance Pyle called the meeting to order at 8:40 a.m. Cynthia Stephenson called the roll and announced that a quorum was present. Lance Pyle welcomed new board member Roberta Gonzales.

Approval of Agenda

Lance Pyle asked the Board to move 7B loss prevention update to after approval of the minutes. Danny Monette made a motion to approve the agenda, moving 7B after approval of the minutes and Brandy Thompson seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Approval of Minutes of August 14, 2024

Greg Shaffer made a motion to approve the August 14, 2024, minutes and Charlene Webb seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Executive Session - Pending and Threatened Litigation for Bernalillo, Dona Ana, Luna, Otero and Socorro Counties Per New Mexico Open Meetings Act 10-15-7-H(7)

Jhonathan Aragon made a motion to go into executive session to discuss pending litigation in accordance with the Open Meetings Act 10-15-7-H(7) for Bernalillo, Dona Ana, Luna, Otero and Socorro Counties. Danny Monette seconded the motion, which passed via a roll call vote: Jhonathan Aragon, Lance Pyle, Charlene Webb, Roberta Gonzales, Lisa Sedillo-White, Shirley Ragin, Cynthia Singleton, Greg Shaffer, Kate Fletcher, Brandy Thompson and Danny Monette. Lance Pyle certified that the only things discussed were pending and threatened litigation for Bernalillo, Dona Ana, Luna, Otero and Socorro Counties in accordance with the Open Meeting Act. Greg Shaffer made a motion to come out of executive session and Kate Fletcher seconded the motion. Brandy Thompson made a motion to authorize the amounts as discussed by the Board in cases 2024-10-1, 2024-10-2, 2024-10-3, 2024-10-4 and 2024-10-5, and Danny Monette seconded the motion, which passed via a roll call vote: Jhonathan Aragon, Lance Pyle, Charlene Webb, Roberta Gonzales, Lisa Sedillo-White, Shirley Ragin, Cynthia Singleton, Greg Shaffer, Kate Fletcher, Brandy Thompson and Danny Monette.

The board took a break at 12:50 p.m., resuming at 1:01 p.m.

Board Presentations

Executive Director Update

Joy Esparsen discussed Amendment 4 that will appear on the November ballot, affecting more than 300 county elected officials' compensation. She discussed strategy for changes to IPRA, stating she, Michael Eshleman and Mark Allen met with NMFOG, adding that dozens of cities and counties responded with concrete recommended changes to the law. She noted that FOG recognizes IPRA is being misused. She let members know Grace Philips met with LFC director Charles Sallee regarding funding \$8.2 million for the Detention Reimbursement Fund. She said last month the NMC board did her annual review and approved the 2025 meeting calendar. She said the Legislative Conference website will go live next week, adding that the state has 60 new commissioners who will attend NMC's BIPO Conference.

Financial Reports

Richard Garcia reviewed payment status from members of their capital investment, noting Eddy, Lea, Luna, Roosevelt and Union Counties paid their three-year investment in full and Curry and Guadalupe Counties paid one year in full. He noted counties that had not yet submitted payment for their Year 1 first half and Lance asked board members representing those counties to reach out to the managers. Richard reviewed the consolidated financials as of August 31, 2024, noting current assets of \$19.48 million indicating more cash on hand due to capital investment payments by members that were not yet invested. He noted investment unrealized loss of \$4 million and increase of \$3.8 million the prior year. Total liabilities of \$112.7 million increased \$30 million from the prior year. NMCIA's net position as of August 31, 2024 was \$24.9 million. Reviewing the income budget statement, Richard noted claims and claims adjusting expenses were 111% of budget as of August 31, with total expenses of \$44.9 million at 103% of budget. Richard presented the August 31 investment statement that indicated \$96.1 million fair market value of investments with 87% of assets invested with Wells Fargo. Grace Philips let board members know Strategic Asset Alliance was conducting a SWOT analysis of investments that would be finished by the end of the month.

Risk Management Update

Grace Philips let the Board know that the increase in law enforcement claims was extraordinary and resulted in an 80% increase in reinsurance premium for 2025. She said she emailed every county manager not serving on the NMCIA board about the large increases expected in contributions. She said she sent a letter to Chaves County about their contribution increase and coverage decrease considering the detention center not receiving reaccreditation. She said San Juan County would like to hear a presentation for their March 31 renewal. She has collected data for three years on the cost to operate detention centers in the state which are \$321 million annually, adding the average occupancy rate is 57%. She will ask to meet with the Courts, Corrections & Justice committee again. She said the medical assisted treatment (MAT) procedures take effect September 1 and are very onerous, especially with no funding, adding that Roosevelt County has a MAT program and has spent hundreds of thousands of dollars to launch it.

Patricia Lovato presented the loss ratio reports as of September 30, noting the 10-year average for law enforcement through policy year 2023 was 115.22%. The five-year average for multiline excluding property and auto physical damage (ADP) was 88.80%, the APD five-year loss ratio was 82.57%, the 10-year property loss ratio was 86.33% and the workers' compensation loss ratio was 80.49%.

NMCRe Update and Renewal Premiums

Grace Philips said the NMCRe board at their September 19 meeting set the date for their annual shareholder meeting of 8:30 a.m. December 4. She said the board elected Greg Shaffer as secretary with Steve Kopelman's resignation from the board, as he now serves as chief operating officer. The board also approved reinsurance for NMCIA for 2025, with Law Enforcement coverage unchanged and a total premium of \$5,874,256, an 80.4% increase. Multi-Line coverage will remain unchanged with a flat renewal of \$470,000. She said premiums were determined by the actuary with a 75% confidence level.

Board Action Items

Approve 2025 Multi-Line and Law Enforcement Reinsurance

Greg Shaffer made a motion to approve reinsurance coverage offered by NMCRe in the amounts of \$5,874,256 for Law Enforcement and \$470,000 for Multi-Line. Brandy Thompson seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Approve 2025 Budget

Grace Philips presented the 2025 budget, noting she kept everything flat that she could, including administrative fees and loss prevention. She indicated the large increase was the law enforcement claims expenses. She let board members know she reduced the Legal Bureau budget from \$250,000 to \$50,000, as the bureau is paying for itself. Charlene Webb made a motion to approve the 2025 budget as presented and Kate Fletcher seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Consideration of Policy on Sheriff Commission Agreements

Grace Philips presented a proposed policy on sheriff commission agreements, as assigned from the Board at their last meeting. She said the policy included eight provisions she would like to see in all agreements. Cynthia Singleton asked for a change to the last provision to include language that would accommodate her officers traveling out of state, as her do in neighboring Colorado. Danny Monette made a motion to approve the policy with the noted language change and Brandy Thompson seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Schedule Special Board Meeting and Underwriting Committee Meeting in November Cynthia Stephenson let members know the underwriting committee would meet November 4 but had not scheduled a follow-up meeting that likely will be necessary. She also let members know Lance Pyle wanted the board to consider a special meeting via Zoom to approve contributions before re the next regularly scheduled meeting. The underwriting committee agreed to a second meeting at 8:15 a.m. on November 8 and Lance Pyle called for a special board meeting at 3:00 p.m. November 14.

Approve 2025 NMC/NMCIA Calendar

Cynthia Stephenson presented the NMC-board-approved calendar, noting the six regularly scheduled NMCIA meetings. She also presented the 2025 litigation committee schedule and the schedule of staff presentations during regular board meetings. Jhonathan Aragon made a motion to approve the NMC/NMCIA calendar as presented, and Charlene Webb seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. Lance Pyle made a motion to approve the 2025 litigation committee meeting schedule and Brandy Thompson seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Approve Updated 2024 Coverage Agreement: LE-6

Grace Philips presented one change to the 2024 Coverage Agreement: LE-6 that details limited per-occurrence coverage for whole or partial allegations of failure to provide adequate medical or mental healthcare to inmates or detainees. She let members know that Chaves County did not receive reaccreditation of their detention facility. Brandy Thompson made a motion to approve changes to the coverage agreement as presented and Jhonathan Aragon seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Board Reports

Legal Bureau Update

Brandon Huss reviewed actions of the Bureau since the Board's last meeting, including handling cases on behalf of 18 counties, managing 87 open litigation matters for member counties directly, and finalizing settlements in 10 cases.

Loss Prevention Update

Greg Rees updated board members on the rollout of the Lexipol program to sheriff offices, indicating Sandoval County is up and running and Chief Deputy Allen Mills praised the program, saying it is a game changer. He also reviewed a risk control tool created by Benchmark Analytics that provides a risk forecast paired with recommendations to reduce risk through an analysis of claims data and an evidence-based survey. Greg said the program will also analyze the Pool's loss prevention program and will help us collect data, stating Benchmark will analyze our claims in Origami. He said he will focus the program initially on detention operations.

Workers' Compensation Update

Kamie Denton let members know she updated the department's claims manual and is working to finalize it. She reminded the Board that the Workers' Compensation Administration is completing an audit of operations and that she is confident the department will receive a good outcome. She said senior adjuster Pamela Lowrance is leaving and that her last day with NMC will be October 30.

Multi-Line Update

Robin Martinez said she interviewed three applicants for the claims examiner position and made an offer to one individual which was declined with no further response. She will likely re-advertise the position. She hired NMC's receptionist Rebecca Young as the department's administrative assistant.

CRL Update

Grace Philips let members know, she, Lori Urban and Robin Martinez attended the CRL property meeting, noting it is a tough line of coverage nationally, reminding members we must have an accurate property value, as CRL's margin clause provides 125% of the reported on a total loss claim. She said CRL has seen a significant erosion of their unrestricted fund balance and as a result is under surveillance by the Vermont insurance regulators, adding that the surcharges and capital adequacy contributions are an attempt to increase that balance. She then gave a history of CRL and noted CRL covers \$3 billion in property for NMCIA members.

Other Business

No other business was discussed.

Adjournment

Danny Monette made a motion to adjourn the meeting and Brandy Thompson seconded the motion. The meeting was adjourned at 2:46 p.m.

Approval of Agenda

Charlene Webb made a motion to approve the agenda and Brandy Thompson seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Board Action Items

Approval of 2025 Multi-Line Contributions

Grace Philips presented the proposed 2025 Multi-Line and Law Enforcement contributions. Board discussion included request that she schedule a meeting with county managers to provide context for the 2025 contributions. Lance Pyle noted individual county contributions reduced as by much as 30% and increased by as much as 187% from the last year. He noted that actual contribution amounts may change based on member deductibles. Greg Shaffer made a motion to approve the Multi-Line contributions as presented and Charlene Webb seconded the motion, which passed unanimously via roll call vote: Jhonathan Aragon, Lance Pyle, Charlene Webb, Roberta Gonzales, Shirley Ragin, Cynthia Singleton, Michael Meek, Greg Shaffer, Brandy Thompson and Danny Monette.

Approval of 2025 Law Enforcement Contributions

Lance Pyle asked staff to try to get the contribution information to members before the BIPO conference, possibly hosting a Zoom meeting with managers so they are briefed ahead of time. Grace Philips stated she would reach out to manager affiliate chair Joy Ansley to get a meeting scheduled. Lance Pyle noted individual contributions will reduce by as much as 47% and increase by as much as 271% compared to the prior year, depending on the deductibles chosen by members. Brandy Thompson made a motion to approve the Law Enforcement contributions as presented and Shirley Ragin seconded the motion, which passed unanimously via roll call vote: Jhonathan Aragon, Lance Pyle, Charlene Webb, Roberta Gonzales, Shirley Ragin, Cynthia Singleton, Michael Meek, Greg Shaffer, Brandy Thompson and Danny Monette.

Approval of 2025 Pass-through Coverages

John Chino presented the 2025 renewal premiums for the pass-through coverages, noting the cyber liability carrier will not provide a bindable quote until December because of possible cyber events. He said he spoke with the underwriter who said NMCIA had good loss experience in 2024, and he expected a flat renewal for 2025. John stated the crime premium is a slight decrease, the special event liability and directors and officers policy renewals will have a flat premium. He said he did not have a quote yet for the equipment breakdown policy and let the board know to conservatively expect a 10% increase, adding he may not have a proposal for a couple of weeks. He noted a flat premium for the flood policy, a small increase of 7.17% in the pollution premises liability policy, a slight decrease in premium for the pollution storage tank premium, with an anticipated flat renewal for the Grant County fuel tank policy, which is written separately. He said in 2024 NMCIA paid \$1,037,000 in premiums. He is confident in the numbers he presented, with approximately 94% of the premiums known. Charlene Webb made a motion to approve the renewal premiums as presented and Danny Monette seconded the motion, which passed unanimously via roll call vote: Jhonathan Aragon, Lance Pyle, Charlene Webb, Roberta Gonzales, Shirley Ragin, Cynthia Singleton, Michael Meek, Greg Shaffer, Brandy Thompson and Danny Monette.

Board Presentation

Strategic Asset Alliance Presentation

Nathaniel Simon of Strategic Asset Alliance presented his firm's SWOT analysis of NMCIA and NMCRe's investment program. Designed to be a high-level review of the key investment process recommendations, the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats analysis will serve as a road map for future priorities and activities. Strengths included robust investment policies for both NMCIA and NMCRe. Noted weaknesses included current net position (excluding the captive NMCRe) falls below the risk capital target and remains under pressure, especially from the Law Enforcement program.

Other Business

Lance Pyle asked Richard Garcia if all members had paid their first capital adequacy invoice. Richard noted he had not received payment from San Miguel or Taos Counties. Lance instructed staff that if the members did not pay by November 30, to put an item on the December 4 agenda to discuss how to hand the situation.

Adjournment

Lance Pyle adjourned the meeting at 4:18 p.m.

Executive Director Update Re:

On October 28th, NMC participated in a roundtable discussion with the New Mexico Municipal League and Home Builders Association on housing issues around the state. The conversations focused on the lack of affordable housing, current markets, interest rates, supply chains, construction workforce, permitting delays, planning and zoning, and other relevant topics. It is anticipated that the NMML will schedule subsequent meetings to engage local mayors and managers.

Online registration for the NMC 2025 Legislative Conference opened on October 30th. The conference will be held in Santa Fe from January 20th – 23rd. The last day for advance registration was November 18th. There are currently 561 registrants and standard registration rates of \$350.00 will continue through January 9th. Rooms have been held for the NMCIA Board of Directors, NMC Board of Directors, and Advisory Council at the Eldorado Hotel and will need to be confirmed with a credit card. Courtesy rates for lodging will be offered to all other participants at the Drury Plaza, Hilton Santa Fe, La Posada, and Hotel Santa Fe.

Constitutional Amendment #4 was successfully passed by the voters on November 5th. This amendment removes the legislative authority over county elected official salaries. NMC has responded to several questions from counties about the implementation process and shared these responses with both the Managers and Attorneys Affiliates. Ultimately, counties will need to work through their leadership and county attorneys to determine how they will choose to implement any increases in elected official salaries.

The Better Informed Public Officials (BIPO) Conference registration opened immediately following the General Election. The conference will be held at the Marriot Pyramid Albuquerque on December 10th – 12th and is done in collaboration with the NM EDGE Program. There are currently 109 registrants and counties are encouraged to have all newly elected officials participate.

NMC's Executive Committee met with the New Mexico Municipal League Executive Committee on November 20th to discuss their respective legislative priorities. The meeting generated good dialogue about the importance of local government collaboration prior to and during the upcoming legislative session. Additional negotiations and discussion are anticipated on the inspection of public records amendments, municipal code cleanup, and equitable

disclosure initiative. The next equitable disclosure stakeholder meeting is also being held on December 4th. NMC Legislative Team also presented the the legislative priorities during the Department of Finance Budget Conference on November 21st and will be presenting to the Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy interim committee on December 17th. Currently, 18 counties have adopted resolutions in support of the NMC legislative priorities.

NMC staff is in the process of updating and consolidating its meetings and travel policies to remove redundancies, repeal outdated information, and address conflicts between the two documents. The Board of Directors will consider these changes during the January board meeting.

NMC has hired Hannah Woods as the new Government Relations Specialist in the Administrative Services Department. She has a background in public policy and is looking forward to working with NMC's Legislative Team and federal grant programs. NMC has had difficulty filling the vacancies for the ML Claims Adjuster and Operations Assistant. Both positions have been readvertised in local newspapers and on social media.

New Mexico Counties 2025 Legislative Priorities

HB2 Appropriations

Detention Reimbursement Fund

Fully fund the County Detention Facility Reimbursement Act Fund to reimburse counties for the actual cost of housing state inmates. Increase the Fund by \$3.2 million. Current fund at \$5 million.

Courthouse Funding

Authorize continued funding to AOC for the construction and renovation of state district courthouses. Counties maintain that courthouses are a state responsibility and that the rising costs of construction, security, and IT necessitate a shared revenue stream.

Detention Recruitment & Retention

Authorize continued funding for the newly formed Corrections Workforce Capacity Building Fund administered by DFA. Adequate detention staff are essential to a safe, welloperated facility, which is directly correlated to community safety.

Firefighter/EMS Recruitment Fund

Authorize continued funding for the Fire & EMS Recruitment Fund administered by DFA for fire departments to staff, recruit, and retain career and volunteer firefighters and EMS personnel. Call volumes have increased by 50% and response systems are over-burdened. The average volunteer age is 65 years.

700 MHz Radios

Authorize continued funding for the monthly operational costs of 700 MHz radios to build out state interconnectivity infrastructure.

Additional Appropriations

Ensure that SB 148: Repealing Taxation & Revenue Administrative Fees and SB 151: Insurance Premium Tax Distribution to the EMS Fund are implemented as passed during the 2024 Legislative Session.

Equitable Disclosure

Treat residential and non-residential property transfers equitably to allow for accurate valuation of non-residential real property. Information would be used for statistical and analytical purposes only.

IPRA Improvements

Amend the Inspection of Public Records Act (IPRA) to exempt from disclosing specific information and prohibit certain requests used to compromise and obstruct critical local government services.

Resources to Support Border-Related Humanitarian and Crime Efforts

Appropriate \$5 million to counties for services provided to state and federal agencies to support border humanitarian and crime efforts. This funding will be used to combat drug and human trafficking networks; to coordinate with community services that provide food, transportation, shelter, and family location; and to coordinate with state and federal agencies on information sharing and coordination of state law enforcement activities.

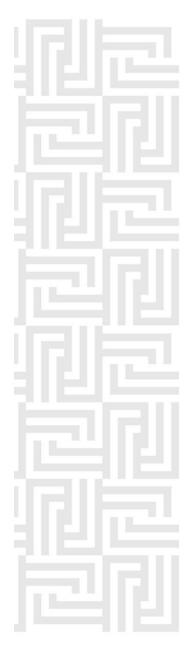

In 2024, the New Mexico Legislature and Governor Lujan Grisham were quick to respond to critical local government needs for public safety personnel and resources. The appropriations you provided are vital to filling vacancies in county detention centers, fire districts, and emergency response as well as increasing support services for the EMS Bureau and 700 MHz radio interoperability. We are also requesting continued funding for state district courthouses and an increase to the reimbursement amount for state prisoners housed in county detention facilities.

HB2 Appropriation Requests:

- ♦ \$3.2 million for the County Detention Facility Reimbursement Fund
- \$20 million for state district courthouses
- \$25 million Detention and Fire/EMS Recruitment
- ♦ \$6 million for 700 MHz radios
- Ensure implementation of the 10% Health Insurance Premium Tax to EMS Bureau (SB151—2024) and TRD administration fee repeal (SB148—2024)

The NMC Board is also advocating for legislative action to create equitable disclosure of commercial property sales to Assessors, amend the Inspection of Public Records Act, and secure local government funding to support state and federal initiatives related to border humanitarian efforts and crime prevention. Throughout the interim, NMC is actively collaborating with multiple stakeholders to refine these proposals.

On behalf of the NMC Board of Directors, we are grateful for your unwavering commitment to addressing the needs of county governments. Your thoughtful consideration and proactive approach have not only strengthened our local communities but have also set a commendable precedent for collaborative governance. 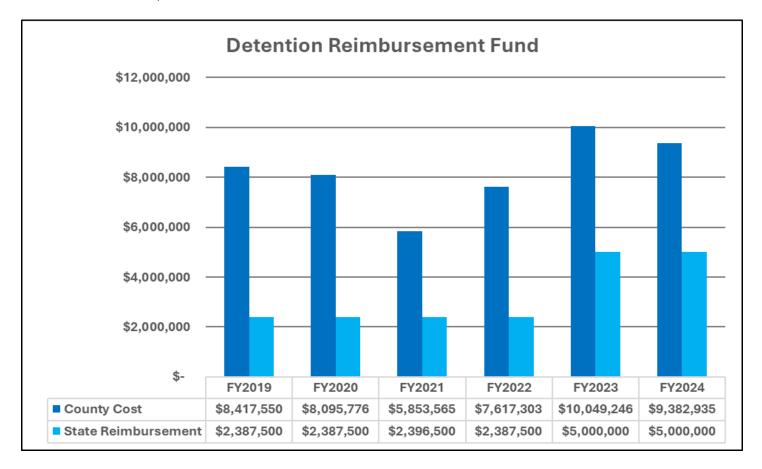

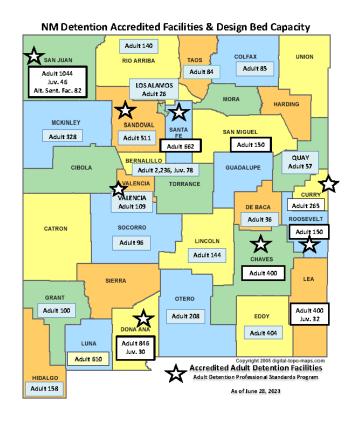
Detention Reimbursement Fund

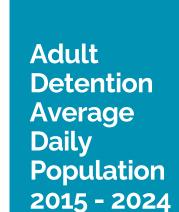
New Mexico Counties requests an appropriation of **\$3.2 million** for the County Detention Facility Reimbursement Fund, (NMSA 1978 §33–3B–4), to reimburse counties a percentage of the cost for housing felony offenders who have been sentenced to confinement in state correctional facilities, in county facilities.

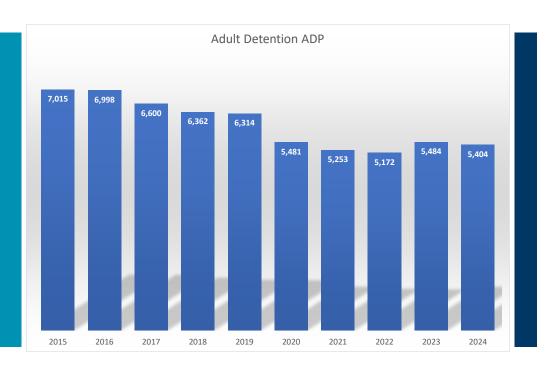
The County Detention Reimbursement Fund was **created in 2007 with a \$5 million** appropriation following litigation between the counties and state. It diminished to less than \$2.5 million over the next decade. The Legislature **restored it to the 2007 amount of \$5 million** in 2022 but the five-year average cost to house New Mexico Corrections Department inmates has been calculated by the New Mexico Sentencing Commission to be \$8.2 million.



NM County Detention Facilities' Design Bed Capacity & Accreditation Status







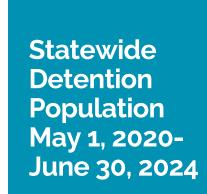


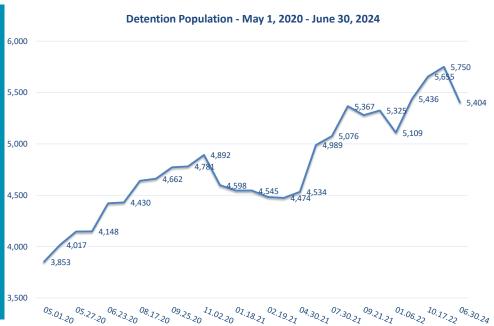

Courthouse Funding

New Mexico Counties requests continued funding to the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) for the construction and renovation of state district courthouse complexes. State district courts no longer reflect a single judge residing at a county facility the way the territorial statute first intended. State courthouse complexes can reach well over \$50 million in construction costs, and the addition of a single judge can

cost a county \$2-\$3 million for renovation and increased operational support. Counties maintain that courthouses are a state responsibility and that the rising costs of construction, security, and IT necessitate a shared revenue stream.

In 2023, the Legislature appropriated \$23 million to AOC to assist with these critical needs. \$15 million was designated to resolve litigation between the 8th Judicial District Court and Otero County. AOC received over \$22 million in requests for the remaining \$8 million.

In 2024, the Legislature appropriated \$10,000,000 to AOC to continue this shared revenue stream, contingent upon a county match of at least 50 percent of project costs. The Budget Committee met in May 2024 to consider project proposals and awarded the bulk of this funding. However, \$1,315,000 in matching funds remain and AOC is currently requesting proposals for this balance. A continued appropriation is necessary to meet the ongoing needs of state district court complexes.

New Mexico Counties requests an additional appropriation for the Detention and Corrections Workforce Capacity Building Fund established by the legislature in 2023 (NMSA 1978 §9-6-19). The Fund was created to assist counties with critical detention officer vacancy levels in county facilities notwithstanding significant pay increases, to attract and retain employees.

In 2024, the Legislature appropriated \$25 million to the Department of Finance & Administration (DFA) for grants to bolster public safety. This significant investment is designed to help offset the cost of new detention and correctional officer salaries for three years. DFA received requests for over 850 positions. Final awards included 189 new officer positions to provide critical support to 22 local entities and the New Mexico Corrections Department. It is evident in the number of requests that the need is greater than the funding provided and consideration for an additional appropriation is a priority for New Mexico counties.

Firefighter & EMS Recruitment

New Mexico Counties requests an additional appropriation for the Fire & Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Recruitment Fund. New Mexico's counties rely heavily on volunteer personnel for fire, EMS, and emergency management services. In many counties, paid staff is limited to one or two individuals. Increasing the number of paid firefighters and EMTs will improve response times, department capacity, and Insurance Services Office (ISO) ratings.

In 2024, the Legislature appropriated \$25 million to the Department of Finance & Administration (DFA) to help offset the cost of fire and EMT salaries for three years. DFA received 64 requests for over **330** positions. Final awards included **190** new positions to provide critical support to 59 local entities. It is evident in the number of requests that the need is greater than the funding provided and consideration for an additional appropriation is a priority for New Mexico counties.



700 MHz Radios

NMC requests **\$6** million in continued funding to the Department of Information Technology for use in FY2025 to fund the payment of subscriber fees for the digital trunked radio communications system for municipal, county and tribal public safety agencies that provide law enforcement, fire, medical or other emergency services.

Additional Appropriations

EMS Funding

In 2024, SB151: Premium Tax for Emergency Services, as amended by Senate Tax, redistributes a portion of the Premium Tax from health insurance business to the Emergency Medical Services Fund at the New Mexico Department of Health.

The amendment also added an \$11 million non-reverting, General Fund appropriation to the Emergency Medical Services Fund for use in FY2025 and beyond to carry out the purposes of the Fund. These changes provide a critically needed reoccurring revenue stream for EMS statewide.

Repeal of TRD Administrative Fees

SB 148: Repealing Taxation & Revenue Administrative Fees passed on the final evening of the session. This bill abolishes the Taxation and Revenue Departments' authority to impose an administrative fee for the collection and distribution of local option gross receipts and compensating tax.

The fee elimination will provide an additional \$26M to counties after a delayed implementation period.

Equitable Disclosure

NMC seeks legislation to treat nonresidential (commercial) property owners the same as residential (homeowners) to ensure that property transfers and sales are handled fairly and equitably. Currently, commercial owners are held to a lesser degree of accountability than homeowners. All property should be accurately assessed at fair market value to ensure transparency for the property owner, reduce the risk of sudden and unanticipated increases, as well as provide stability for county revenues and services.

NMC and the Assessors' Affiliate are hosting statewide public meetings throughout the interim to garner input from business owners, realtors, builders, and other associations. This is an important discussion this year with the two veteran ballot initiatives that are likely to reduce impact property taxes. The potential impact cannot be made up through yield control as many counties are already at their mill rate caps.

Inspection of Public Records Improvements

NMC seeks to amend the Inspection of Public Records Act (IPRA) to exempt from disclosing specific information and prohibit certain requests used to compromise and obstruct critical local government services. IPRA was intended to provide government accountability and transparency. Instead, overwhelmingly burdensome and often frivolous requests have been submitted solely for the purpose of interfering with vital services such as elections and public safety.

During the interim, NMC is working with multiple stakeholders to refine this proposal and identify solutions that do not interfere with the original intent of the Act. In 2023, HB232: Disclosure of Certain Information amended IPRA by enacting changes for the protection of critical IT systems, undercover law enforcement, and restricting certain proprietary technical and business information. It was the first time that IPRA had been amended since its enactment.

Resources to Support Border-Related Humanitarian & Crime Efforts

NMC requests an appropriation of \$5 million to counties for services provided to state and federal agencies to support border humanitarian and crime efforts. This funding will be used to combat drug and human trafficking networks; to coordinate with community services that provide food, transportation, shelter, and family location; and to coordinate with state and federal agencies on information sharing and coordination of state law enforcement activities.

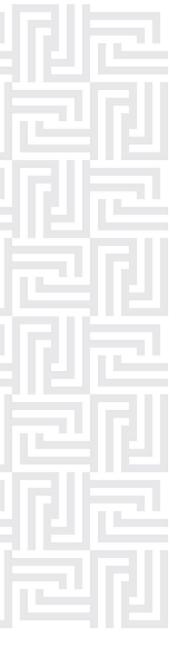

- Conducted meeting between SAA and our Wells Fargo investment manager.

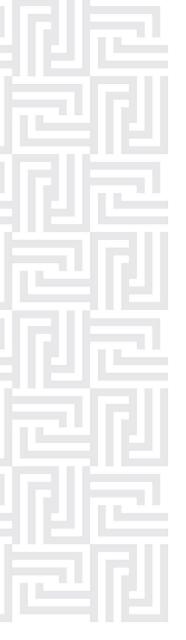

Greetings Board Members,

As only a month has passed since our last update, we only have a few noteworthy facts to report. We currently have 88 active claims open. During the last month, we worked with John Grant, Robin Martinez, and Nick Autio to settle the Hernandez v Luna County matter, where an infant was killed. You will recall that we finalized that settlement during the last Board meeting.

The most exciting case we resolved in the last month was Rottland v Otero County. In that case, we recognized problems in service and naming several years ago. Last week, we were able to convince the district court judge that those issues were fatal to the claim and we obtained a full dismissal with prejudice. As the claim was a wrongful death claim, the risk savings was significant and the County will pay nothing on that claim.

We also finalized settlements in the Patrick Leat v Bernalillo County matter, a jail death claim involving medical care issues (\$50,000) and Eric Vigil v San Miguel (the Board previously approved \$1,100,000).

Since the time since the last report is so brief, I do not have further information to report, but will be happy to answer and questions at the meeting.

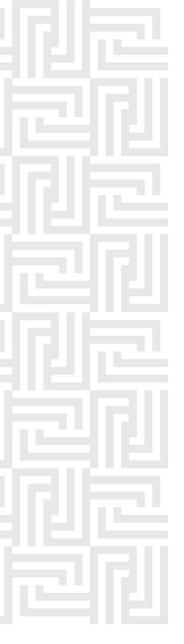

All Group 1 agencies have regular recurring meetings with their PM's now. Group 2 agencies have completed the Kick-off meetings and have started the review of Tier I policies; Bernalillo CO has requested to start this project in Novmeber when they have a project manager available. There are three agencies that have started the review of Tier II policies. Highlights: • Taos CO was not able to meet in October due to other priorities. • Chaves CO missed most meetings in October with no notice; process is slow due to a lack of meeting. • Roosevelt CO has not submitted the Use Agreement and has not returned emails - no engagement. • Cibola CO sent in the Use Agreement, but has not responded to set a pre-implementation mtg. • Socorro CO cold most meetings this month due to other committments. • Harding CO (Group 3) has started early and was able to meet three times this month.

Re: Workers' Compensation Department Update

- Effective July 1, 2024, NMCIA provides workers' compensation coverage for 31 of the 33 New Mexico counties.
- The Workers' Compensation Claims Department Manual update was finalized in October 2024. It will be reviewed on an annual basis, and any necessary changes will be made during that time.
- The New Mexico Workers' Compensation Administration has begun auditing the pool's open workers' compensation claims. The anticipated completion date is January 2025.
- As of October 31, 2024, we had 612 open workers' compensation claims (the oldest dating back to 1991) with a total incurred of \$47.4 Million. Of these open claims, 135 were from detention centers, and 130 were from sheriff departments.
 - The top five causes of injury by classification are strain, fall or slip, struck or injured by an object or person, miscellaneous (includes exposure/BBP), and motor vehicle accidents, with strains having the highest frequency and severity.
 - The most injured body part classification is multiple body parts, with 151 open claims as of October 31, 2024, and a total incurred of \$15.5 Million.
- Since its inception (01/01/1987), NMC has received 28,332 workers' compensation claims with a total incurred of \$171.5 Million as of October 31, 2024.
